

## TROOP 93 RULES OF CONDUCT

In Troop 93, we offer the program as defined by the Boy Scouts of America. All scouts are expected to live by the Scout Oath and Law. Those ideals should dictate all Scouts' behavior. Any behavior that goes against the Scout Oath and Law disgraces the Scout, his parents, the adult leaders and the Troop. Please have fun but behave appropriately.

Meetings and outing activities are planned to provide enjoyment and advancement opportunities for the greatest possible numbers of scouts. Adult leadership resources are limited and generally unavailable for handling long-term and recurring behavioral problems, such as foul language or disrespect.

Violations of the Scout Oath and Law will result in the Scout facing the following actions:

First offense:

Meeting with Scout, parent and Scoutmaster and/or other adult leader. The next event (not including meetings) will require a parent accompany the scout to monitor the scout's behavior.

Second offense:

The Scout will not be allowed to attend the next event (not including meetings).

Third offense:

The Scout will be asked to leave the troop.
